

Here you can find the latest news direct from our region's young people.



## Nalin, Rising to the Occasion

High School is too often defined by the subjects you do rather than the experiences you have. This narrow view of education is something Ms Johnson is challenging through the development of a new learning experience to Kepnock State High School in 2019; the introduction of a Human Powered Vehicle (HPV) program. Nalin.

Kepnock's HPV Team 'Nalin' has brought a journey of growth and new experiences to a young bunch of enthusiastic students, mostly from the Special Education Program at Kepnock SHS. These students have come together to form Kepnock's first ever Human Powered Vehicle (HPV) team and have positively represented Kepnock across multiple competitions around the region this year. Their success left Ms Johnson, Team Manager, and our school extremely proud.

Each HPV race involves its own unique challenges as the team attempts to complete as many laps as possible in the set amount of time, changing drivers when needed as well as looking after and maintaining the bike during driver exchange. The team have conquered many difficulties along their journey, from the construction of the bike to the difficulties faced out on the track. Despite racing in searing heat and torrential rain, and facing challenges such as their bike crashing, these students have handled these issues and continued to powered through. Resilience, determination and cooperation are traits shown by all members, whether it's during training or out on the track. They never stop pushing to be the best they can, so much effort is put in not only from the students but teachers such as Mrs Johnson, Mrs Parr and especially Dave Bate.

Nalin: the Taribelang meaning of 'we all'. The HPV team name 'Nalin', was carefully chosen after many discussions and meetings with members of the local indigenous tribe. From the very beginning the students wanted their team to have a strong indigenous influence. The unique name itself reflects the inclusive nature of learning at Kepnock. "We all" is related to the idea that 'we all' work together, 'we all' are one. The teams design of their bike includes the distinctive long tailed brown hawk commonly found circling above it's native local Kepnock area and the indigenous design and hand painted artwork were created in special consultation with local indigenous artist Lesley Johnson.

Nalin have had an exceptionally successful first year of competition, attending four tournaments, with each race increasing in intensity and stamina needed compared to the last. Their first race consisted of riding for six hours in Bundaberg, where they placed 2nd in their division and received "Show and Shine" best bike design award. Their second race saw them bring home first, after an eight hour race in Benaraby. The Qld State titles race in Maryborough was an incredibly gruelling 24 hour race and was by far the longest and most exhausting race these students have faced. Despite a very serious crash that left their bike damaged, they continued on, creating a remarkable result of second place in the state for their division.

The students encouraging and compassionate attitude towards other competitors and teammates has lead them to build an amazing reputation amongst the HPV community as well as making friendships with other teams from all over the state.

"Kepnock's authentic approach to this sport has allowed the students involved in this incredible experience, to change and grow in level of confidence, maturity, and responsibility" -Ms Johnson

Team effort, spirit and sportsmanship epitomises what the Kepnock HPV Program is all about, learning valuable communication and social skills to get along with each other and even more so, perform as a team. Simply being given the opportunity to be involved in such a program has come to mean a great deal to every member of Team Nalin.



### Certificate Courses at School – The Future? By Mikayla

The year 2019 marks a milestone for Kepnock State High School and its students, with Certificate Courses being offered to Year 10. Work experience has been offered at Kepnock SHS since 2005 and in the 13 years, it has been around, Kepnock SHS is now moving from a 'work experience culture to a training culture'. These students have engaged themselves in new opportunities, setting aside their school education for four block weeks during the year.

Education in the 21<sup>st</sup> century is the foundation for everything we do and Kepnock aims to provide their Year 10 students with additional knowledge to become creative, confident and resilient learners ready for a future outside of school.

Year 11 students have approached the new system head first with senior education's expectations flying through the Altering Queensland's curriculum by using the roof. 'Australian Tertiary Administration Rank' or ATAR has changed the way we do things at Kepnock and teachers have sourced a solution to provide students with a Plan B. As such, during Senior Secondary, a student must receive 20 points or more to be eligible to graduate and in completing a course students can achieve three points for completing a Certificate I course and earn an extra point by completing additional elective units. By completing a Certificate II course, students will gain a total of 4 points that can be banked towards their Queensland Certificate of Education. However if a student were to complete a dual-certificate II and III, they would be eligible for 10 QCE points.

This venture was created to provide students with a greater opportunity to earn the total required QCE points to graduate and to help to reduce the likely event of stress associated with Year 11 & 12. While organising the courses, Kepnock's Registered Training Organisation Manager, Ms Giddins, found difficulty in finding interest in some courses as students did not realise the value of the knowledge gained by studying the courses. Having access to these courses using the VETIS, Vocational Education and Training in Schools, funding provides a "safety net" to fall on if someone were unable to gather the necessary points for the QCE, due to sickness for example.

After completing each course students receive a national qualification, giving each student an edge against other schools in Queensland who haven't had the same opportunity, "There is no other school in Queensland who has pushed the boundaries," affirmed Ms Giddins. Studying in specific industries can lead to students finding part-time work while still at school or the chance to participate in school-based traineeships such as a work, earn and learn program or combining school and work together.

The completion of the Certificate II courses has benefited both students and teachers alike. Students have engaged themselves in their training programs and saw value in what they were learning. While watching trainers, teachers have learnt techniques to engage students in the classroom. The 12 training organisations that were brought in have established positive relationships with the students and are all excited about the progress, having never done this before.

The Certificate Courses open to Year 10 was successful in many ways. It has provided students with a qualification before the most difficult years of school allowing flexibility to students who either make the decision of continuing through to Year 12 or withdrawing to pursue a different life choice. Students have learnt skills that can be brought into their current subject areas and improve the way they learn. Certificate Courses for Year 10 – the way of the future.



Hi, my name is Lauren Cuthbert, I'm the current chairperson for the headspace Youth Engagement Committee (YEC), so I thought I'd introduce myself.

I've been volunteering with headspace since the end of 2016. I have been a part of many different community initiatives and events in that time, as well as overseeing the various youth groups headspace runs, and telling my story at events.

Over the last 20 or so years, I have gone through many hardships. I was born with a disability that affects many of the bones in my body, including, but not limited to my fingers, feet, ears and skull. I have had multiple surgeries to correct some of these issues, but I still struggle every day with restricted movement and chronic pain. It has been hard, especially during my teenage years, to feel as though I fit in.

Helping out at headspace, being a part of the YEC, and the role we play has really improved the way I see myself and the world around me. My time with headspace has taught me many valuable skills, such as public speaking, leadership, and the importance of concept development and planning, among many other skills that have been a great help to me while transitioning into adulthood. I have learnt many life lessons with regards to friendship, accountability and my own worth as an individual. headspace has really helped me make sense of those things and supported my growth as a person immensely. I look forward to my future with headspace, and the skills it will teach me.
