Here you can find the latest news direct from our region's young people!





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## Cancer fight goes by the book as IDSHS students Write a book in one day!

On Wednesday 23 June, 28 dedicated students from Years 8 -11 participated in writing a book in one day for children's cancer research.

It was all part of *Write a Book in a Day*, an annual competition promoting literacy, collaboration and creativity, administered by independent national charity, The Kids' Cancer Project.

This year, Isis District State High School was privileged to enter three separate teams in the competition. On the designated writing day, the

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teams were given a set of parameters unique detailing the characters, setting, and issue to be used as stimulus for their individual story. Within the hours of the school day they wrote, illustrated, and submitted a storybook to targeted а youth audience. In a remarkable feat, our three wonderful teams each successfully rose to the challenge and completed an original story of 3500 words with fully illustrated front and back covers and complimentary illustrations throughout.

The completed books were then uploaded to an online library to give access to children undergoing treatment in hospitals across the country.

This event gave our students the opportunity to develop skills that will set them up for life such as teamwork, problem-solving and leadership and it was truly heart-warming to see our kids helping other kids.

I enjoyed the day because of the great cause. I would definitely do it next year and it has given me a taste of what being an author is like




and it's very cool. I highly recommend it! [Armani, Year 8]

## **Curious Minds: Girls excelling in STEM**

Over the past 6 months two of our students, Chloe and Sarah, have been participating in the Curious Minds program. Curious Minds is a hands-on extension and mentoring program that aims to ignite girls' passion in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Participants have the opportunity to make new friends, be exposed to outstanding role models, practise new skills, and deepen their understanding of what their future may hold in STEM. Both Chloe and Sarah have been interviewed on ABC Wide Bay about their experiences.

"I was selected to participate in the 2020-2021 Curious Minds Program as a result of my participation in the 2019 Australian Mathematics Competition in which I received a High Distinction. The program was comprised of two virtual camps, one occurring in December 2020 and the other in July 2021. In the space between these two camps I was assigned to a STEM coach and we worked on a project in an area I was Interested in.

My STEM coach was Hannah Ryan, a PhD student with the University of Melbourne who is studying the deadly Tuberculosis disease. We caught up over zoom every three weeks or so and worked together on my project whilst also chatting about a range of other topics...

My project was about different pain relief drugs, focusing on common pain relievers, the pain pathway and emerging pain treatments. I chose to work on this project because I work in the local chemist and wasn't really sure of the difference and side effects of the different drugs. This project really opened up my eyes about all of the different pain relievers and all of the discoveries being made in the medical field every day.

I really loved the program because I met so many other girls my age who have similar passions in science... I was also exposed to a wide range of careers in a number of different fields and heard huge success stories from a number of published scientists and a range of university students from

rural and urban areas. It was an amazing program and I will always value the experiences, knowledge and friendships that I have gained".

#### Sarah, Year 10 Student

"The Curious Minds program took place from December 2020 to July 2021 with 200 girls from across Australia. Through the virtual camps and catch-ups I was exposed to new elements and areas in Stem. We were privileged enough to meet the Chief Scientist of Australia along with many other women in science and hear their stories. With the help of coaches, we completed a project related to an area of science we are interested in. My coach was Renee Goreham and over the six months we completed a research investigation focusing on the research question: Is nature or nurture more prevalent in causing many of the brain abnormalities and traits held by organised serial killers and narcissists?

We then presented our projects to our peers at the final camp. Through the supercharge sessions we grew our confidence in areas of science, made lasting friendships and completed numerous experiments such as programming a micro bit and dismantling and recycling a hard drive. It is an opportunity I would recommend to anyone, regardless of whether you think your good at science, there is bound to be something that interests you and the experience was truly enlightening to the endless possibilities for a future in science".

## Tertiary Mentorship Program



Past students who are currently attending UQ, QUT or CQU returned to Bundaberg State High on Thursday 15 July as part of our Tertiary Mentorship Program. Peter Sajko, Isaac Newbold, Brooklyn Davis, Katie McCord, Tiarn Johannesen, Swasna Chad, Natalia Frick and Kirsten Buckholz spoke with students from Years 8, 9, 11 and 12 interested in undertaking a university pathway. In a question and answer panel interview our **students were able to get the 'real story' on a wide range** of topics that they were curious about such as accommodation, travel, student clubs and societies, sport, making friends, university websites, university applications, scholarships. Other topics included Centrelink, working while at university, time management, mental health, security/safety at university, plagiarism, university services, O-Week, classes and changing degrees. It was a privilege to welcome these fine young people back to school and it was so rewarding to see their willingness to give back to the school and pass their experiences on to other cohorts.



## Media Arts Workshop

Academy Award-winning cinematographer Greg Huglin spent a day with our Year 10 Media Arts students in an intensive workshop that allowed students the opportunity to experience being a part of a rigorous film shoot. Through Greg's Noosa Film Academy, students were able to get first-hand experience using cameras and movie equipment, and ultimately produced their own short film.

Students began the day viewing a movie montage of Greg's past work before taking part in a production meeting to discuss the process of making a short film

in the space of four sessions. In a team effort, students became directors, producers, script writers, actors, sound technicians, and clapperboard operators. The end of the workshop featured a cinema style viewing of their finished work.

The Year 10 students then had the opportunity to see their edited production screened on the silver screen at the Moncrieff Entertainment Centre on Saturday night at a red-carpet event.

## An Interview with Our New Principal, Mr Chris Gill



#### Where did you work before coming to Bundaberg State High?

For the past five years I was Principal at Isis District State High School. Before that I was Deputy Principal here at Bundaberg State High for eight years and before that I was Head of the Mathematics Department here. I was also a teacher at Bundaberg North State High for ten years and a teacher at Alice Springs High School.

#### What is different about Bundaberg State High since you left in 2015?

Bundaberg State High has always been a school with a great tradition and a very strong reputation in the community, and I am very pleased to say that the school is in great shape. I have been really impressed with the friendly and respectful attitude of students. The atmosphere around the school is

very positive which is a credit to the way the staff have gone about creating a safe and supportive environment. As I walk around the school I see all classrooms with students engaged in learning activities in a calm and orderly environment. I have also been impressed with the incredible range of opportunities available to our students in a broad range of curricular and extra-curricular opportunities. Pretty much anything students want to have a go at is available to them.

#### What are your plans for the school?

Firstly, I can't wait to see our magnificent new building open at the start of next term, providing state of the art learning spaces for our students. The school will be developing a new Strategic Plan in 2022 following a School Review. This will be an exciting opportunity to get feedback on our school from a large selection of our community members to inform the direction of the school for the next four years. I am committed to continuing to provide as many opportunities for our students as possible and to engage with our broader community to ensure all students have the opportunity to access viable pathways for their future.

### Work Experience spotlight:



They were given five 90-minute trading periods where they could experiment with logistics

such as number of employees, retail price of product, inventory amounts, material orders, training, research and development, debt repayment, and much more.


