

Here you can find the latest news direct from our region's young people.





# Second Year in a Row @ Curiocity

For the second year in a row, we have a team selected to participate in the Brisbane Curiocity competition which is part of the World Science Festival. We were featured on the Today show last year with a Musical Water Fountain. This year's exhibition - 24 June to 10 July – we feature TIMMEE.22 on display on the Sister's Green at the Queensland Museum.

It started in Term four of 2021, when Campbell, Samira, Noah, Sarah, Charlotte and Taliah (2022 year 11 and 12 students) put their brains together to create a complex representation of today's world through the combination of STEM and arts to be displayed at the *World Science Festival in* 2022.

After extensive brainstorming TIMMEE-22 was born. This arcade-style game combined the everevolving technological world of this century with the sheer beauty and cycles in the natural world. Initially, the ideas were abstract and unique, featuring a large head enclosed in a glass box

displaying the natural and analytical sides of the brain. The idea was to achieve a display which users could interact with through a Pac man-like game which caused changes inside the box, showing the impact of human interactions with the world around us. A jester turned architect helped bring their ideas to life with a full day of brainstorming and altering the student's original idea to develop a plausible design for him to get to work on before the big day.

After much deliberation, their ideas had morphed from a convoluted idea to the masterpiece which is TIMMEE-22. At the World Science Festival this year (in Brisbane on June / July Holidays), the public can interact with their design which now mimics an arcade game for all ages to enjoy and learn from. With an old-school appeal, TIMMEE-22 displays the relevant message that a balance between the elements and humanity is sorely needed to maintain the beautiful, healthy planet we call home.


## **Robotics Club Developments**
