





The Big Shift


It is not every day that you see classrooms complete with their desks and chairs in them, being moved down the street! Yet in June that is exactly what happened in Childers!




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The Teenage Brain

We will be getting an extended Administration building and an extension to one of our practical areas to make room for a purpose built music room!



The Reef Guardians program aims to promote environmental awareness throughout the school and community by recruiting a group of enthusiastic young students to carry out a mission of reducing the massive impacts plastic and waste currently make on our society and environment.

So far this year, Kepnock has seen many passionate students show their eagerness to conserve our environment through their excitement to participate in new programs such as planting broccoli crops in the Agriculture farm, collecting the tuckshop's pizza boxes to turn into mulch and even spending some of their weekends at the *Boomerang Bags Sowing Bee*. The Reef Guardians have also made a special point to dive into action to reduce the amount of single use plastic that we use at our school.

The Containers For Change program has raised almost \$1000 dollars this year alone, a program introduced into Kepnock by our very own Reef Guardians that allows for the collection of plastic bottles and containers from food and drink items purchased from the tuckshop. The containers are then handed in for recycling, and money is fed back into our school! How cool!

When asked what the future holds for the Reef Guardians program, Mrs. Amey confidently replied with, "It's going to go from strength to strength." The amazing dedication these students have shown from day one is outstanding, and with their constant positive attitudes and determination to make a difference, these young inspiring young conservationists are undoubtedly set for great things.

In addition, by using all local contractors and suppliers, it benefited the larger Bundaberg community and provided jobs for Bundaberg locals.

Kepnock SHS Principal Mr Nick Howkins said that with the increased facilities in the new Multi-Purpose Hall, interschool sport competitions such as volleyball and basketball could now be held at Kepnock SHS and offer the broader community a diverse range of facilities.

A student in Year 8 commented that the MPH looked "absolutely stunning". Not only are the facilities inside the MPH a significant upgrade of facilities, but there has been a lot of vegetation added to make the space outside the sports hall as friendly, peaceful and inviting as possible.

The upgrade to A-Block has given the school multiple brand new training spaces to use for a range of purposes such as a lecture about stress management and study organisation for all OP eligible Year 12 students during Pathways lessons and teacher training on the Pupil Free Days. In addition, the new conference, meeting and training rooms were the site for the roll out of the new iPads.

Kepnock State High school has been a part of the Bundaberg community since 1964, and these two new additions will certainly help to enhance our education and make Kepnock the great school that it is today.





"I am passionate about breaking down the stigma of mental ill health and ensuring every young person knows they are not alone, especially when it feels like they are," Ms Wright said.

"When I was growing up, I experienced being bullied and suffered severe anxiety. It wasn't until I started volunteering with headspace Bundaberg where I started to gain confidence and realise I could be a voice and help others. The opportunity to sit with another 21 young people is amazing, I am so excited for what we can achieve. I love how headspace truly listens to what matters most."

Young people around Australia are chosen to sit as hY NRG members for an 18-month period. Kay was successful in gaining a position to represent alongside 20 other young people, from more than 140 applicants. Young people from all walks of life and varying lived experiences are chosen to represent headspace on the national committee, so that the voice of young people advise and influence the best service for all youth.
